Stage 1 Excursion: The Old Schoolhouse Museum

Bright and early on Thursday 17 June, Year 1 and 2 excitedly bundled onto the bus to visit the Old Schoolhouse Museum in Ryde. This trip was an immersive experience, aimed to enrich their learning in History.

A week before the trip, classes had received a handwritten letter from Molly Mathers, who had once attended the school - decades before. Molly invited students to closely observe details at the museum and compare the old schoolhouse to their own 21st century classrooms and experiences.

Upon arrival to the venue, students were greeted by 19th Century Principal Wright, resplendent in his coat and top hat. After a quick morning tea break, students were divided into three groups so that they could rotate through a variety of activities. Dressed in aprons and collars, they learnt Maypole dancing, drills with dumbbells and marching, and played games like quoits, knuckles and jacks, skipping and 'fly'.



Inside the classrooms, Stage 1 enjoyed attempts at running writing with pen and ink (dipping nibs into inkstands made writing quite thrilling!), practised their letters on slates and recited times tables. They discovered what canes were used for (during which they were very well-behaved), had a go at mapping, stamps and tracing, and undertook a scavenger hunt. Many were bemused by the 'hair-dryer on a stand' which turned out to be an old Singer sewing machine. Perhaps

the most popular activity, however, was toasting bread over an open fire, then munching on their snacks, drizzled with golden syrup!

A big thank you to Mrs McMahon who organised the excursion and to our staff who attended. Thanks also to the parent helpers who joined us for the adventure – particularly assisting with the toast.

It was reportedly 'so much fun', but most expressed being very glad to be attending school now, in a time when we have technology - and no canes in the classroom!

From the P&C

President's Report

We have reached the end of week 10, term 2, semester 1 and we're officially half way through the year! As everyone will have seen, our school community are continuing to face an ever-evolving situation in relation to the pandemic and the situation regarding restrictions is a fluid one. Please keep a look out for updated information from the school and thank you, Mrs White, for continuing to keep us informed – often responding to departmental updates requiring a quick turnaround.

Some changes...

As a P&C we have some small changes coming into effect from next term, including the updated prices in the uniform shop for both pre-loved and new uniform items; and we have changes both in terms of volunteers and relating to



some new menu options in the canteen. We are also looking at some fundraising ideas for next term, and, as has become the norm, our Events Team are planning as best they can with the ever-changing rules and restrictions.

P&C Donations

I would like to offer a sincere thank you to all of our families who have already paid their P&C donation for the year — THANK YOU! At risk of repeating myself, our continuing operation depends on the financial support we receive from our families, especially over the past year and the current one. All of our children benefit from your generosity, and I can confirm that we have already approved payments for a number of items from our 2021 Wishlist, including: computers, resources for Lego robotics, Silvereye readers and sports equipment. These are items that our children can begin benefitting from immediately, and without your support, this would not be possible.

In addition to the Wishlist items, we provided for the replacement of two of the classroom whiteboards from our technology contingency fund this year, as we were aware that they were likely to fail soon, and sure enough, one of them now has. We will be replacing that whiteboard to ensure the continuation of high-quality teaching delivery in the classroom concerned. We anticipate that the second of the two whiteboards will require replacement at some point over the year. Our contingency fund will also cover the replacement of that unit.

If you are yet to make your P&C donation for the year, you can make your payment by completing the payment advice attached to the P&C donation letter, by direct deposit or via Flexischools, which is very quick and straightforward – it will even advise you of the amount to pay depending on the number of children you have at the school. You also have the option of making additional P&C donations or making a donation specifically for our Environs. Thank you again for your support and generosity.

P&C Volunteers

Please ensure that, if you are volunteering for the P&C, perhaps in the canteen or for an event, or if you are volunteering for the school in the various classroom groups, you will need to ensure that you have completed the form previously called the Appendix 5 Declaration, and to have provided the school office with your photo ID. The school office requires a couple of weeks to process the declarations and undertake the background checks mandated by the Department of Education, so please allow enough time to do this before you are due to volunteer.

This mandatory process applies to all canteen volunteers and the school will not be able to allow anyone to volunteer in the canteen if they have not completed the paperwork and received approval. The P&C and school are working closely to ensure that we are all complying with these necessary procedures.

As the community will be aware from the emails requesting volunteers for the canteen, ensuring that we have the appropriate number of volunteers for each canteen service continues to be a challenge. From term 3, the canteen will only be able to operate a service if there are sufficient volunteers signed up to cover each shift for the day. This is to ensure

that food quality standards are consistently met and that the safety of anyone working in the canteen is prioritised.

The canteen cannot operate in a safe way if it is not properly staffed and we are currently in a position where we are increasingly reliant on our paid staff to operate the canteen, rather than it being a volunteer led service.

I am particularly concerned about the Friday service, which is consistently a very busy day, processing a significantly greater number of orders than the Monday or Tuesday services. Subject to any new Covid-19 restrictions we may be facing next term, we will be introducing an additional volunteer on Fridays, to assist with the busiest part of the day.

If you are able to support our canteen by volunteering, please either pop your name on the roster or contact Alex in the canteen if you're not sure what is needed. We greatly appreciate your help and THANK YOU to those volunteers who have been working in the canteen so far this year.

I hope that everyone enjoys a happy, safe and relaxing holiday, and I look forward to seeing everyone at the P&C meeting next term. The meeting is scheduled for the 20th July 2021 and I intend to continue offering attendance via zoom.

Uniform Shop Report

It has been a busy term for the uniform shop with change over to winter uniforms and full review of the pricing of both our new and second-hand uniform items along with a full stocktake of all items in the uniform shop. Hopefully all families have had a chance to view the updated price list that was distributed via email last week. The new pricing will take effect from next term and prices will be updated in Flexischools in the coming days. I am happy to advise that many items have been reduced in price (including girls summer dresses and formal skorts, girls winter tunics, boys and girls shirts/blouses, microfibre trackpants and zip jumpers) however it has been necessary to increase the price slightly of a few items due to increase in supplier costs (includes school bags, girls bootleg pants, sports polos, dry and cosy jackets and girls long socks). As mentioned in last week's email, there are also a few items that are being sold at a discounted price - these include an older style of the boys long and short sleeved shirt in Size 14 with an ink print rather than embroidered logo at \$16 each, Rain jackets in bottle green at \$15 each and a couple of new school bags with some superficial damage from storage at \$23 each (marks should come off with a clean). All clearance items are available for purchase from the uniform shop on a Tuesday morning.

Worn Up Update

Last Friday was out first collection of worn-out school uniforms for recycling with 4 full boxes of uniforms being collected and saved from ending up in landfill.

The Worn Up pod has been temporarily removed from its normal location near the school canteen whilst I confirm if it is possible for us to receive another collection free of charge (sponsored by Ku-ring-ai council). Hopefully this will be the case and the pod will be returned to collect any additional unwearable school uniform items again next term.
