# **School Newsletter**

#### From the Principal – Mrs. Ruth White

Dear Families,

#### School Vision

Gordon East Public School is a welcoming and collaborative school community that supports high quality learning. Quality teachers inspire students to be creative and critical thinkers enabling them to become active and informed global citizens.

#### **School Reports - Academic Grades**

#### Academic Grading (A to E)

Last week we introduced the Common Achievement Scale (that is, 'grades'). The five-point scale for reporting student achievement (A to E) relates to a body of 'expected learning'. In NSW, this refers to the stage-based syllabus that guides the delivery of the NSW Curriculum. The scale provides teachers with a means of rating students' understanding of the curriculum taught that semester.

We can use Geoff Masters (Australian Council of Educational Research) descriptive interpretations – 'initial' (emerging), 'partial' (developing), 'complete' (proficient), 'sophisticated' (extending) to assist us in better understanding what each A – E rating means on the department's common achievement scale.

The following scale is used for Years 1 to 6:

A Outstandin g	They have an extensive understanding of the content and readily apply this knowledge. In addition, they achieve a high level of competence in the processes and skills and can apply these to new situations.				
B High	They have a thorough knowledge and understanding of the content and a high level of competence in the processes and skills. In addition, the student can apply this knowledge and skills to most situations.				
	Proficient				
The student demonstrates a complete understanding of the concepts and competencies relevant to the expected learning					
C Sound	They have a sound knowledge and understanding of the main areas of content and has achieved an adequate level of competence in the processes and skills.				

	Developing				
The student demonstrates a partial understanding of the concepts and competencies relevant to the expected learning.					
D Basic	They have a basic knowledge and understanding of the content and has achieved a basic level of competence in the processes and skills.				
	Emerging				
The studen	The student demonstrates an initial understanding of the concepts and competencies relevant to the expected learning.				
E Limited	They have an elementary knowledge and understanding in few areas of the content and has achieved very limited competence in some of the processes and skills.				

It is important to note that each semester, programs taught may focus on different aspects within a subject. Assessment, observation and reporting for that semester will reflect the content of the programs. As such, it is **not** necessarily the case that a student who receives a lower grade in the first semester will receive the same or a higher grade the following semester.

#### How are grades awarded?

Every child at Gordon East Public School is known, valued and cared for. As such, their individual progress is an important part of assessment and reporting discussions. Teachers meet regularly to share student work samples and assessments with each other and discuss how a cohort is travelling overall.

Teachers use a combination of assessments, evidence in student work samples and in-class observations to allocate grades. Each grade (A to E) sits within a band of marks. This being the case, a single grade encompasses a range of students' marks: some students may sit at the higher end of the band, some at lower and others in the middle.

If you have questions about where your child sits within the grade range once it is awarded, you are able to make an appointment with your child's class teacher to discuss this further.

#### What does it mean if my child receives the same grade at the end of Semester 1 and Semester 2?

If a student receives the same grade for two consecutive reports they have made progress. For example, if a student receives a Grade C in the middle of the year and again at the end of the year they will be making progress. Between the two reporting periods the student will have learned new knowledge and skills of a more advanced nature. In order to receive a Grade C on the second occasion the student has *a sound knowledge and understanding of the main areas of content and has achieved an adequate level of competence in the processes and skills* in relation to this new and more challenging material.

#### Parent Tips, Tricks and Support Tools

## What is Reading Comprehension?

Comprehension is an active process that involves the reader understanding and interpreting what is read. Comprehension is important in every subject and even good readers can experiences challenges with comprehension at one time or another.

Different strategies work with different types of text, however, successful readers continually monitor if something 'makes sense' to them as they read and re-read sections. Coralie Janssens, a learning difficulties advisor for NSW public schools says this is an example of 'self-checking', something good readers do continually. "Some children who have difficulty with comprehension ignore that what they have just read didn't seem to make sense, and just plough on, " she says. "They often think that being a good reader means not having to go back and reread things, but the opposite is true. Good readers continually ask themselves 'did it make sense?'. If it didn't they go back and reread it, and slow their reading speed accordingly," Coralie explains.

#### Three things you can do right now to help.

What ever the stage of reading your child is at, the following three strategies are easily adapted to suit the range of ages of students throughout their schooling.

#### 1. Ask your child to explain the text to you.

When children put what they have read into their own words, it helps in two ways:

- Firstly, as a parent, you know they have understood what they have read.
- Secondly, putting it into their own words actively helps them to comprehend and remember the information.

#### 2. Ask them questions

If they can't explain the text to you, break it down by asking them questions like:

- What do you think this paragraph/story/page is about?
- What do we already know about the subject or characters? (Where is it set, who is in the story, what are they like?)
- What else might help us understand the information are there pictures or diagrams that provide clues?
- Are there any words here that you didn't understand? (Then help them to look the word up in a dictionary or through an online search.)
- What do you think the main points were? (Perhaps underline them if the book is yours, or make notes. Some kids might even prefer to draw quick sketches if they are very visual.)

#### 3. Wait – take a breath, and let them answer in their own time

If your child seems to be taking a long time to answer, wait. Silence can be frustrating for a busy parent, but it's actually a sign your child is trying to make the connection from A to B to C in their brain. Give them the time to successfully find their own way there.

Learning is a process. Your child needs to make the connection from A to B to C in their own brain in order to be able to repeat the process later. If you point to "C", they haven't created

When we ask the above types of questions, the temptation is to rush in and answer, or to

this pathway in their own brain, and so they haven't fully comprehended the text.

If they still don't have an answer – and any answer is a sign they are doing the work and trying to make the connection – ask a slightly different version of the question.

#### What are some other things you can do to assit reading comprenhension?

#### What children can do to help themselves:

point a finger at the answer on the page. Don't.

- Use outlines, maps, and notes when you read.
- Make flash cards of key terms you might want to remember.
- Read stories or passages in short sections and make sure you know what happened before you continue reading.
- Ask yourself, "Does this make sense?" If it doesn't, reread the part that didn't make sense.
- Read with a buddy. Stop every page or so and take turns summarizing what you've read.
- Ask a parent or teacher to preview a book with you before you read it on your own.
- As you read, try to form mental pictures or images that match the story.

#### What parents can do to help at home

- Hold a conversation and discuss what your child has read. Ask your child probing questions about the book and connect the events to his or her own life. For example, say "I wonder why that girl did that?" or "How do you think he felt? Why?" and "So, what lesson can we learn here?".
- Help your child make connections between what he or she reads and similar experiences they have felt, seen in a movie, or read in another book.

- Term 2 Issue 8 • Help your child monitor his or her understanding. Teach them to continually ask themselves whether or not they understand what they are reading.

  - Discuss what your child has learned from reading informational text such as a science or social studies book.

#### Recycling

We are in the process of putting posters on the recycling bins so it is clear what should go in what bin. The posters will include pictures of canteen items, so students know how to deal with the packaging.

- The yellow recycling bin is currently located between the hall and the COLA next to the fence this is for mixed recycling
- The blue bins are located between the silver seats and the library these are for paper recycling
- The red bins are located around the silver seats these are for rubbish that can't be recycled Note: there is a completely blue bin located along the path to the back gate which is being used as a standard rubbish bin a poster will be going on that too!

\*BioCups are made, in part or full, from bio plastic – this is commercially compostable however as there is currently no collection for commercially compostable materials they need to go in the standard rubbish bin. Alternatively, you could experiment with some home composting!


